A BETTER LIFE FOR THE ANIMALS AT AAP

In 2024, AAP was once again able to improve the lives of many exotic mammals. For example, we were able to rescue Barbary macaques Meyers and Lori from tiny, rusty cages in an apartment complex in the Spanish city of Granada. Unfortunately, help came too late for Lori and she passed away. However, Meyers is now doing well. The young serval Noa escaped from her Dutch home, but her owner did not want her back. She has now been given a place at AAP. And the twelve lions – including nine cubs – that AAP rescued from a French circus now, have a second chance in life in our rescue centre in Spain.

ANIMALS OUTPLACED

Most animals stay at AAP temporarily. Once they have recovered, our Planning & Logistics department looks for a suitable permanent home for them. In 2024, 108 animals (46 primates, 4 big cats and 58 other mammals) found new homes with partner organisations in Europe. Through mediation in our network, we were able to find a suitable shelter solution for another 32 animals. Unfortunately, two animals had to be returned to their owners after confiscation.

PREVENT ANIMAL SUFFERING IN EUROPE

WE FOCUS ON:

- private ownership of exotic animals
- wild animals in entertainment (such as circuses)
- illegal wildlife trade



PRIVATE OWNERSHIP OF EXOTIC ANIMALS

AAP has been advocating for years for the introduction of a Positive List: a list of animal species that are suitable as pets. All animal species not on that list are not allowed to be kept as pets. Fortunately, the Dutch Positive List for domestic and hobby animals came into force on 1 July 2024.

AAP also stimulates other countries to implement Positive Lists. Our efforts over the past year have therefore once again focused

on the European Union and on individual member states, particularly Spain and Germany. In 2024, we organized activities together with German animal welfare organizations to convince German politicians of the need for legislation on the keeping of pets and hobby animals. In addition, we exchange knowledge with other member states about Positive Lists, and we are working on an assessment system that countries can use when drawing up their own Positive List. This system helps determine which animal species are suitable as pets.

ANIMALS IN ENTERTAINMENT

AAP continues to advocate for a ban on the use of wild animals in circuses. In 2024, we have completed a study to determine which EU member states still do not have effective legislation regarding the use of wild animals in circuses. We have determined that six member



states are lagging behind, and AAP supports animal welfare organizations in these member states to push for the introduction of relevant legislation.

ANIMALS IN ILLEGAL TRADE (BARBARY MACAQUES)

In 2024, we continued our Born to be Wild project to safeguard the survival of the endangered Barbary macaque. This international collaborative project started in 2017 with a contribution from the Dutch National Postcode Lottery. Over the past

year, we have been working in the Moroccan Tazekka National Park to prepare a group of Barbary macaques for their return to the wild. All of these animals have fallen victim to the illegal trade, but in 2025 they will finally have the chance to be released back into the wild.

EXPENDITURE

Of our expenses, 81.2% goes to AAP's primary objective: sustainably improving the welfare of exotic mammals. That is 81.2 cents of every euro we spend. In addition to housing and care costs for all the animals, we also spend part of this on our prevention work. We spent the remaining 18.8% on things necessary to keep the organization running.
